STARTS WITH PRAYER

From the National Prayer Team

It was once said that when God wants to send revival, He sets His people to praying. God is setting the Free Methodist Church to praying! Like a small wave in the ocean, there has been a gradual increase in prayer among us. It's seen in the corporate prayer times, and we are hearing stories of churches giving more attention to prayer. The disciples saw the connection between Jesus' life of prayer and His powerful ministry and so they asked Him to teach them to pray. We are asking Jesus to do the same among us.

Each year the FMCIC dedicates a week in January to prayer and fasting. We do this to start the new year focused on the Lord as churches and followers of Jesus. The national online prayer meetings (over 200 the first Sunday night, an average of 60 at the noon hour and the last Sunday night, about 50 in person, and over 1000 views online). In addition to the opportunities provided by the National Prayer Team, churches devoted extra time to prayer during the dedicated week. We praise God for such a wonderful sign of renewal and revival! We would love to hear from others about the prayer initiatives they engaged in and any sign of answers to prayer. When we share our stories, we encourage others to press on in prayer and to seek the Holy Spirit's direction.

This coming year we want to keep pressing into prayer for the various needs we have in our personal lives and in our churches.





GROWING IN FAITH & HOPE: CBS RESOURCES FOR INDIGENOUS AND DIASPORA COMMUNITIES

The Canadian Bible Society (CBS) is committed to ensuring that all people, including Indigenous and diaspora communities, can access God's Word in their heart language — helping them deepen their faith and support their efforts to reclaim their language.

Empowering Indigenous Communities Through Scripture

Upon invitation, CBS is working alongside Indigenous partners to translate the Bible into Indigenous languages. The Blackfoot Bible is a long-term effort to provide a complete Bible for the 6,450 Blackfoot speakers. As part of the Inuktitut Bible Revision, the revised New Testament was published in 2021, providing 40,000 Inuktitut speakers access to God's Word. After 200 years, the Mohawk Bible translation was completed. Published by CBS

in 2023 thanks to the efforts of Harvey Satewas Gabriel and his team of translators who spent nearly 24 years translating the Bible. The entire Mohawk Bible was published in 2023, a milestone for Mohawk-speaking believers. The Inuinnaqtun and Inupiaq translations help sustain these unique and vital Indigenous languages, preserving spiritual heritage and offering hope for the future through God's Word.

Supporting Canada's Growing Diaspora Churches

Canada is home to hundreds of diaspora churches. CBS provides printed and audio Bibles in over 70 languages, including Chinese, Arabic, Punjabi, Spanish, Tigrigna, Farsi, Korean, Haitian Creole, and Ukrainian.

Elderly diaspora believers benefit from audio Bibles, helping them engage with Scripture in their heart language despite aging challenges. CBS also supports diaspora churches through expert-led seminars, providing a space to discuss challenges and opportunities.

Through these efforts, CBS ensures that faith remains accessible, inclusive, and deeply personal for all.

It's a great theme for this issue of the MOSAIC, and it is the word that has been running through my mind for the last several weeks as we have begun re-forming Leadership Development into the newly named Ministerial Formation Department.

Most of the Ministerial Formation functions that our churches, pastors, chaplains, counsellors and missionaries have come to expect of us will continue; we'll still be the department that handles credentialing & tracking and all the other MEGAP processes. We'll still administer the scholarship and internship programs. We'll still be there to support churches and pastors with continuing education, foundational courses and other aspects of one's vocational development.

What I'm most excited about — and what gives me the most HOPE — is the new mandate that Ministerial Formation has to lead our movement in creating and fostering a Leadership Development Culture.

What does it mean to create a Leadership Development Culture?"

Well, we have lots of ideas and we're still figuring it out and making plans, but at its core, it means that throughout our movement — in our churches, in our camps, in our roles in academia, as we serve in prisons and hospitals, as we minister in our Armed Forces as Chaplains, as we serve as Counsellors and Spiritual Directors – we are both engaged in developing ourselves as leaders and creating environments where we can raise up new leaders.

We've had this idea of a "tap on the shoulder" in our movement for quite a few years, but is it just an idea? Do we prayerfully seek out people that we can encourage to be a future leader? Do we actually know what to look for in our churches and other ministry environments? Are we brave enough to "tap someone on the shoulder" and affirm the gifts we see in them, offering our encouragement, support and prayers as they begin the process of becoming a leader in our movement?

This can (and should!) start in the young years as we raise up our children and teens in the church and point them to Christian ministry as an exciting, honourable path where they can use their gifts. Or, perhaps, it's recognizing an adult with the skills, passions and call from God and walking with them as they discern vocational leadership in the Church as a second career.

This excites me!

Over the next several months, we'll be implementing some new ideas as we begin refining what a leadership development culture will look like. We can't just press a button and make it happen. There'll be some changes and perhaps even long-entrenched ideas and procedures that worked in the past but are no longer helpful. We'll make mistakes (which will really annoy those of us — me included — who are perfectionists!) and we'll be constantly having conversations, seeking out, trying and evaluating new resources. However, there will be a day in the future hopefully not too far in the future – where we will look back and see a new crop of leaders being formed and developed.

So join me, and let's focus on HOPE as we work together to make this happen!

Growing Global CONNECTIONS

As a kid, I was always fascinated by the map of the world – the continents, countries, and waterways. It was intriguing to me, and I wondered what it would be like to travel to different parts of the world. I only knew about the Fiji Islands because that is where my parents were born and raised, and they taught me about their culture. Over time I navigated living in small towns in British Columbia as a child of immigrant parents. One Sunday morning in the Kelowna Free Methodist church, a young woman came to our church and shared her experiences in Africa. I found it interesting that she felt comfortable sitting down on the steps in front of the pulpit. She spoke with passion and conviction about her education and experiences in Africa. Rev. Peter and Cheryl Banks also visited our church, and their stories inspired me as a young adult. This was my first exposure to missionary work and the global church – these seeds that were planted many years ago.

It is the vision of The Free Methodist Church in Canada to see a healthy church within the reach of all people in Canada and beyond. Over the past 15 years, God has called me to the "and beyond" within the ministry of the International Child Care Ministries (ICCM). We have almost 1,200 sponsored children who are being developed holistically in twelve different countries. When you sponsor a child, you are helping them physically, socio-emotionally, cognitively, and most importantly, spiritually. The beauty of child sponsorship with ICCM is that you are not only helping Free Methodist kids and families, but you are also impacting villages and communities! You are helping to build the Free Methodist church globally! In my fifteen years of visiting brothers and sisters around the world, I have seen how your partnerships have enabled children, families and villages to develop and thrive.

Our Little Church That Gave Big

Church buildings can be expensive – especially older ones. We all have experienced needing to replace/repair one thing after another when our homes get to a certain age. But churches with limited resources sometimes need to push these further down the road. That is, until they all need fixing – at the same time!

That is exactly what happened to one of our small churches in Prince Albert (or "PA" for short), Saskatchewan, situated near the centre of the province on the banks of the North Saskatchewan River. It is the third-largest city in Saskatchewan with nearly half of the people living there being indigenous, and is in a Treaty 6 Territory. The church has been around since 1922, housed in three different buildings, but the current building was showing signs of age and in need of repair.

The part-time pastor, Rev. Dyan Mouland, of the Cornerstone Free Methodist Church shared with us the story of their small church family of about 30-35 people. Recently, their board decided to replace two residential grade exterior doors on their church building. And they really needed replacing — the frames were rotting; the keypads wouldn't line up; and snow sometimes came in through the gaps. After getting quotes, the Board approved the cost of \$3,751 to replace them with proper commercial doors. But the doors did not arrive until the cold weather was setting in. That is when things turned from bad to worse.

One of the three furnaces used to heat the building stopped working, and because of its age (from the early 90s) could not be fixed and needed to be replaced. As good, wise stewards of the building, the board got a second opinion. They agreed with the first.

That is when the second furnace died. So now they needed to replace two furnaces.

The company replacing the two furnaces looked at the third and final furnace and it was clear it would soon join the fate of the first two furnaces. In the span of one month, they now needed to replace three furnaces as well as the two exterior doors that were letting snow into the building for a total cost now at \$18,756!

As warm and friendly as this little church family is, it could not keep the -30 degree Saskatchewan winter out, and they needed help — fast. They had raised just over \$3,000 but it was nowhere near what was needed. That is when they turned to The FMCIC Ministry Centre who was able to provide a loan to help cover the difference. But this is not where the Cornerstone FMC's story ends.

The Ministry Centre had approved a loan and mailed out a cheque. However, with the postal strike, it did not arrive right away. In the couple of weeks they waited for the cheque, God continued to work in the hearts of people in our church and even people who didn't attend their church. This small congregation with an enormous heart saw their donations go from just over \$3,000 to \$14,020!

Praise God!

Their church had enough in reserves to cover the remaining difference which meant that when the cheque came from the Ministry Centre, they could send it back un-cashed!

I confess I did a happy dance when Dyan shared the story! We continue to celebrate with Cornerstone, and praise God for the generosity of His people.

Together, we are celebrating our God for His generous love for His church.



The Free Methodist Church has a Church Loan and Mortgage Program that can provide our local churches with loans just for emergencies like Cornerstone's. Funds come from Bonds that are invested with us and the interest charged returns to the program to help other churches needing loans. It is like "Impact Investing". Instead of paying a bank interest that goes just to increase their profits, the interest is re-invested into our own local churches needing help. A TESTIMONY IN

Truth & Reconciliation

Several congregations from across Canada have taken steps to build a right-relationship with their Indigenous neighbours. These steps were not all the same. Some Free Methodists were invited to visit First Nations in Treaty 4 and witness the Buffalo Project. Others took time to listen and learn through the KAIROS Blanket Exercise (an interactive history lesson from the perspective of Indigenous people). And still others invited Jonathan Maracle and the music ministry of Broken Walls to share and help build bridges of right-relationship. One church that hosted both Jonathan and a Blanket Exercise was Hillside Free Methodist in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. Following the Sunday service, one congregant shared how the Holy Spirit had used Jonathan's stories and songs to do a new work in him. This is his testimony (used with permission.)

Testimony

My Aunt Maureen recalled the day the "black suits" from the residential school drove up in their long black car. They pointed to the twins, Gerald and Geraldine, who were the youngest. "We'll take these two first," they said, "and come back for the rest later." There were eight children altogether. My Gramma Adelaide Howard, a proud Ojibway lady, was having none of it. She informed the intruders that she had a shotgun and wasn't afraid to use it. The two men left empty-handed and never came back.

The irony was that my grandmother was raising her family in the Catholic faith and had left the reserve, feeling that her children would have a better life. At the time, this meant giving up her Indian status, yet I'm told that she could still be overheard praying in her native tongue.

Jonathan's visit was a revelation to me, for although I'm truly proud of my Native heritage, I'm mostly Old country English on my mother's side and know very little about Indigenous customs and ways since I was raised to fit into a white man's world. My dad did not want his kids to be bullied – and if anyone had ever found out he was an Indian he would surely have lost his job, prejudice being what it was, and sometimes unfortunately still is.

Jonathan experienced it as well when, as a new Christian, he was told by his pastor that he would have to give up being Mohawk. This, of course, was impossible, for as Jonathan so rightly pointed out, Ukrainians who accept Christ don't stop being Ukrainian, nor do the French, the English or anyone else. It would be like trying to deny the heritage and culture that make us who we are.

I've always admired Indigenous Peoples' care, respect and reverence for nature, the earth and the creatures that inhabit it. They were environmentalists long before it was fashionable. Even so, their customs seemed really primitive, superstitious and foreign to me. But Jonathan has taught me a lot I didn't know. Thanks to him, I now know that true Indian giving comes from the heart. I learned the significance of burning sage as a means of welcoming the Creator and as a call to worship. I experienced the beauty of prayer in an Indigenous language – and I appreciated the heartbeat sound of the drum and how it reflects the passion, reverence and emotion of the drummer. But the thing that stays with me most is something I already knew in my heart:

We are all one in our Creator's eyes – and loved very much by Him.

The Sunday before Christmas, a woman who has never shared publicly during our worship service's praise, prayer, and sharing time stood up. I'll call her Beth. I noticed that Beth had a piece of paper in her hands, so I knew she had prayed and prepared to share. The paper was shaking from her nervousness – she is a helper in everything, and prefers to operate behind the scenes – so I knew a Godmoment was happening, and how much this was stretching her. She started with giving thanks, and she thanked so many people who used their gifts to encourage and bless everyone before she reminded us of one word: Opportunity – specifically that God gives us opportunities to partner with Him everyday and everywhere.

We are a small, rural church, and we have developed a wonderful relationship with our local elementary school. The church building is the safe place for the school in case they need to evacuate. We have an agreement with the school board that the church parking lot is used as a bus holding zone in the afternoons, because they just don't have enough space at the school. I know that there are many of us who want to have partnerships with our local schools and just aren't welcomed, but Beth gave

thanks that we are active in the school. Beth's children and grandchildren went to that school and so it is especially significant to her. I give thanks for the principal every day, because the principal has welcomed our help and participation. I pray the principal will be there for another 5 years!

We had the opportunity to help two families in need through the school this Christmas, and I know Beth filled two shopping bags. There was much to give thanks for that Sunday – first, that Beth responded to God's prompting and obeyed by sharing with the church family, even though I know she would have preferred to sit and listen to others. Second, that she shared one word that we continue to use regularly now – and it's not obligation or duty – it's opportunity.

God gives us non-stop opportunities all around us, every day. What opportunities is God giving to you?

Change Management

Change seems hard – for all of us.

Many people are afraid of change, and even minor change feels dramatic, causing some to feel uncomfortable and even fearful about losing the old and facing the new. Many openly resist change, wondering what was wrong with the way it was!

But the world is changing faster than ever – technology, banking, systems and processes. Many of these changes make it easier for churches to connect, receive donations, encourage participation in ministry, and communicate with people in relevant, effective and timely ways. Over the last two years, there has been a lot of change at The Free Methodist Church in Canada (FMCIC) – including new systems and processes, restructuring ministry departments and even new streamlined charts of ministry accounts so that they align with our vision and mission and allow us to minister as a unified, interdependent team.

Although change is needed, it is not easy,

especially on our staff. Our Operations Team may be small in number, but they have worked tirelessly on your church's behalf. On top of all the restructuring, new systems, processes and technology, they continue to work behind the scenes providing payroll, benefits, pension, HR, church loans and mortgages, CRA reporting and compliance, assistance with church incorporations, legal matters, pastoral and church support services, and working alongside and supporting all the other ministries of the FMCIC. They continue to serve in all these areas while going through all the required changes.

The corporate world advocates a structured approach to help manage the "people side" of change. This process is called Change Management. Preparing, supporting, and equipping people to adapt to the new processes, systems and technologies while minimizing disruption to ensure successful implementation. That is a mouthful! This is so important, but there is something else as a faith movement we need to turn to — the Bible.

And the Bible has a word for change management: **Transformation!**

Good change takes initiative, energy, and creativity but it also takes a transformed heart. As we use tools and strategies to help manage change, we know that we cannot do anything without God first changing our hearts. Robert Kelleman, in his article "3 Change Management Essentials," explains that "Transformation starts with hearts: changed leaders change people who change communities. Before we prepare a change management plan, we prepare people. Before we prepare people, we prepare our own heart."

But perhaps we also need to have a change in perception of the ordinary, behind the scenes work of accounting. The Bible tells us that administration is a gift of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:28). Too often the church (and the world) views bookkeepers, finance people, accountants, church treasurers etc. as "overhead" or "admin."

Lori Gunther Reesor writes Generosity Blogs, among many other things, and she calls us to transform our thinking about church people who work behind the scenes. She has a prayer for people at church head office, but it also applies to all those who work behind the scenes in our local churches. Today, this prayer is for you.

When churches, small group leaders and other organizations across Canada find out about these resources, they're often surprised and delighted. We frequently hear that it's just what they were looking for.


That's where our volunteer ambassador program

A Reflection

ON LAUSANNE 4 & CHURCH HEALTH

From September 22-28, 2024, I had the incredible privilege of attending the Fourth Lausanne Congress on World Evangelization at the Songdo Convensia in Incheon, South Korea. With over 5,000 carefully selected participants from 200 countries, the Congress was a global gathering of church leaders, missionaries, and theologians. The diversity and unity of voices testifying to the power of the Gospel was overwhelming (in a good way). However, what struck me most was not just the grandeur of the event but the unseen faithfulness of those who serve Christ in obscurity, in hardship, and in places where their stories may never be widely told — yet they are eternally significant.

I heard testimonies of resilience and courage—stories of faith that endure against all odds. One pastor from a persecuted country shared how he planted an underground church movement in 2005 with just two families. By 2010, the movement had grown to 48 churches, but on December 26th of that year, he and all his pastors were arrested under charges of acts against national security through evangelism.

He spent an entire year in solitary confinement, yet he declared, "Jesus was my light." Even as he stood among us at the Congress, he acknowledged that discovery could mean imprisonment once more, yet he remained steadfast, willing to be counted among those who suffer for the name of Christ.

Another woman, originally from China but now living in South Korea, shared the legacy of the late Pastor Yonggi Cho. I sat beside her during one of the afternoon workshops. When I asked what set him (Pastor Yonggi Cho) apart, she simply said, "he obeyed the voice of God." It is one thing to ask God to speak; it is another to obey. She also emphasized his commitment to prayer—a priority that shaped his life and ministry.

These stories, and many others, reminded me of the enduring strength of the Church despite suffering, war, and poverty. While challenges abound, God's Word remains alive, and the Church continues to grow in the most unexpected places. This is the true measure of church health—not the size of our congregations or the efficiency of our programs, but the unwavering faithfulness of God's people to God (and our fellow Christians) even in the face of trials.

Reflecting on my own journey with Lausanne, I was taken back to my first Congress in 2010 in Cape

Town. I was a young leader, wide-eyed at the scale of the event, but it was in the prayer room where I encountered God most profoundly. At the time, I felt I had nothing to offer, no strategic meetings to attend, no networks to build. So I prayed. A volunteer noticed my consistent presence in the prayer room, encouraged me, and spoke life into my calling. Years later, she even funded my trip to another Lausanne gathering in Indonesia when I couldn't guite afford it. That moment taught me that true impact is not found in self-promotion but in surrendering to God's commendation.

Fast forward to Lausanne 4, I found myself in a different position—more experienced, connected, and in a leadership role in Canada. Yet, a battle for biblical commendation resurfaced. How often do we seek approval from others rather than from God? How much of our ministry is shaped by external validation rather than a life deeply rooted in a relationship with God and in prayer? Paul's words in 2 Corinthians 10:17-18 rang true: "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord. For it is not the one who commends himself who is approved, but the one whom the Lord commends."

For pastors and leaders, the challenge is clear. In a culture that prizes recognition, we must remember that church health is not measured by applause but by faithfulness. The unseen prayers, the quiet obedience, the steadfast endurance—these are the seeds of hope that will bear eternal fruit. May we be found faithful.

We knew costs would be much higher than our previous conference seven years before – but we did not want to burden our churches that were still dealing with recovery from the effects of COVID-19 in church attendance and budgets. The BOA graciously subsidized the General Conference 2024 Budget with \$100,000. With the hard work and management by the Operations Team, we are pleased to say that the General Conference 2024 came in under budget by \$10,000!

At this General Conference, we imagined the future for our movement together, witnessed restored joy and connection with pastors and friends from across our country, experienced a willingness to be part of this movement to see healthy churches across Canada and beyond, and revived hope to come together again in 2027 to celebrate what God is doing amongst us.

Updates to CORE & Giving Streams


Over this past year we have been adapting our Free Methodist systems, structure, and culture to help us become the movement Canada needs – that passionately reflects the vision of The Free Methodist Church in Canada – to see a healthy church within reach of everyone in Canada and beyond.

We have restructured our CORE and Giving Streams to better align all ministries with our vision and mission, as well as to allow for interdependent ministry teams to work together, collaborate, and support each other in the mission of Jesus.

Streamlined Giving Funds

Having designated giving funds can work to raise funds for special projects. However, our former Giving Streams represented only a small portion of the ministry funds actually used. We have always done Church Planting, Leadership Development and Missions out of the CORE Fund. Giving Streams were for special projects and purposes but never encompassed all that we did together.

To make the necessary changes to streamline the giving funds and connect every donation to ministry, we needed to re-map the Ministry Chart of Accounts to better reflect the growing and changing ministry plan. Both the streamlining of Giving Streams and the re-mapping of the accounts has been completed. This diagram shows our newly organized structure:





The streamlined Giving Funds are now structured as follows:

1. CORE Ministry Fund

Includes the ministry of the Bishop Office, Church Planting, Church Health, Ministerial Formation (formerly called "Leadership Development") and Intercultural Missions (all missions in Canada).

2. Scholarship Fund

Was formerly called "Leadership Development Giving Stream" but was always used only for ministry scholarships.

3. Global Missions Fund

Remains as a restricted fund but now for only GLOBAL Missions. Intercultural Engagement Ministry is now funded through the unified CORE Ministry Fund.

4. ICCM Sponsorship Fund

This restricted fund is for our International Child Care Sponsorships and Special Projects. ICCM has always been part of FMCIC – we have the same Charitable Status Number. We can now celebrate together and track the important work ICCM does around the world in 12 countries. We encourage our churches to sponsor as many children as possible through this ministry.

Our Unified CORE Ministry now includes all of the following interdependent ministries:

1. Bishop's Office Ministry

Pastor Networks, Network Leaders and Mentors, Regional Gatherings and Ministerial Conferences, Communications,

2. Church Health & Church Planting Ministry

National Prayer Team; Church Revitalization

3. Ministerial Formation Ministry

(Formerly Leadership Development) – Ministerial Candidates, Credentialling, Retired Ministers, Women in Ministry,

4. Generosity & Stewardship Ministry

CORE Giving, Planned Giving, Generosity & Stewardship

5. Intercultural Missions

(Missions in Canada) Formerly called "Intercultural Engagement Ministry; Indigenous Neighbours, Refugees & Newcomers, Racial Justice and Ethnic Equity, Quebec Churches

6. Operations

HR, Payroll, Benefits and Pensions to pastors and staff; Church loans and Mortgages Program; Support Services; Risk Management; Data and Resource Management; CRA Compliance; FM Foundation

Operations Updates



The year 2024 has seen a lot of changes as we streamlined giving funds and remapped the GL accounts. We have also merged the 5 separate databases into one Contact Resource Management (CRM) Database - a major achievement!

In addition to this, we upgraded both our Internet and servers, to provide better security as well as interconnectedness with staff that work remotely. We have moved to Cloud-based tools and software, and brought better efficiency through e-Transfer for CORE Remittances, and Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) for expense remittances and payments.

We are still on the journey of upgrading, streamlining, connected eco-system of resources and tools to better serve and account to our churches. The CRM goes live in 2025, and a new integrated accounting system is planned for 2026.

All of this to serve our churches, pastors and staff better. It is our goal that anytime someone contacts our Ministry Center, they feel known, heard and helped.






Our Mission Together

The Free Methodist Church in Canada has a rich history of involvement with the work of God around the world. Some of the most fruitful and faithful missionaries throughout in the amazing story of the global Free Methodist Church have come from Canada. We honour the legacy of our Canadian Free Methodist missionaries, and all who supported them for many years with prayer and sacrificial giving.

Global FM Membership



The Free Methodist Church has ministry in over 100 countries in six world areas: Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, Middle East and North America.

Total worldwide Free Methodist membership is over 1.6 million.

Did you know the Free Methodist Church now exists in 105 countries, with a global membership of over 1.6 million? We are a vital part of what can genuinely be called a movement! Nineteen of these national Free Methodist Churches have grown to become their own General Conferences, and all General Conferences participate in the World Conference.

As the work of the Free Methodist Church around the world has expanded and matured, our approach to missions has evolved. God's mission remains central in our FM culture – you can never separate church and missions! Mission is what Jesus calls us to.

The FMCIC currently oversees two international Mission Districts – Ghana and Sri Lanka - but we continue our part in God's much larger story. Many of our Canadian churches are connected directly with Free Methodist brothers and sisters in other countries.



Paula Moriarity is our **Director of International Child Care Ministries (ICCM).** She works with global leaders to enhance our global connection. Did you know that we sponsor 1194 children across 12 countries around the world? But as we re-structure our system to be 'on-mission' with Jesus, starting in 2025, Paula Moriarity will also serve as the Director of Global Missions.







Rev. Adam Kline has been serving as the leader of *Intercultural* **Engagement Ministry.** Starting in 2025, he has now become our **Director of Intercultural Missions.** He has been instrumental in helping our local churches discern and engage with the diverse mission field that is Canada. From building right-relationship with our Indigenous neighbours, to welcoming refugees and newcomers, to incorporating the work of our Racial Justice and Ethnic Equity Team into our movement, to finally, as of January 1st, providing additional support to our churches in Quebec, Adam is helping us to seize divine opportunities right here in Canada. There's no end to our need to be equipped and prepared to bear witness and be intercultural missionaries right where we are, which is why, as Free Methodists, we recognize the necessity of Intercultural Missions.

Ministry Centre

As we restructure and streamline, many of our staff now work remotely, both part-time and fulltime. This affects staff culture, so we intentionally cultivate a culture that reflects Jesus and helps us to serve well together.

We have had our first staff retreat in several years. Our theme was "We are Better Together." We know that we need to work better together in order to serve this movement. We intentionally schedule monthly and quarterly meetings – both virtually and in person – to keep staff informed on what is happening, how we can help, to learn about each ministry and provide opportunities for staff development and training. We also have kept our practice of stopping everything and pausing to pray together every Wednesday at 11 am EST.

In a world of constant change, communication keeps us connected. Lisa Howden, Director of **Communications,** is constantly creating resources to share the Free Methodist story. At the General Conference, the Foundation Video Series covering the seven core beliefs and practices of Free Methodists was launched. These under-two-minute videos delve into the essence of what it means to be Free Methodist, illuminating key aspects of our faith and practice. They cover distinctives of our denomination – Communion, Baptism, Church Membership, Small Groups, Means of Grace, Holiness and Prayer.

Our research shows that generous churches are healthy churches. We want all our churches to be healthy and discover the joy that comes from living generously and reflecting God to a world that desperately needs Him. Sandy Crozier, Director of Generosity and Stewardship has developed five touchstones that cover all biblical principles of Generous Stewardship that can be applied to any age, any ministry, any life to help people grow in holistic generosity so that together, we are a sustainable, joy-filled, generous movement, making a difference in Canada and Beyond.

Under Generosity and Stewardship is our Planned Giving Program. As we disciple people to live generously both now and through their estate plan, we are seeing over \$8.7 million in estate plans with 51% or \$4.88 million designated to the FMCIC churches, camps and partner ministries. Just image what good your planned gift can do! And it is all free for anyone associated with our ministries and done completely over the phone.

Ministerial Formation



Rev. Kevin Stenhouse has been appointed as our Director of Ministerial Formation.

We are continuing to make a way for current and future leaders through intentional development pathways for credentialing as a minister within our movement. This includes young persons wondering if credentialed ministry might be in their future, those in the early stages of ministry and tracking for credentialing; our local church pastors and chaplains, and retired pastors. Our movement has always valued seeing, encouraging and developing leaders from within our churches; it's always been a part of who we are!

Three active groups function under the purview of the Ministerial Formation Office:

1. Ministerial Education Guidance and Placement (MEGaP) committee: In 2024, five ministers were ordained and three ordained ministers from other denominations transferred into the FMCIC. In addition, we welcomed three new Ministerial Candidates who are tracking toward ordination. Supporting the lifelong learning of those serving in ministry is one of our priorities, demonstrated in part by awarding scholarships in the amount of \$79,711.72. Since 2008, a grand total of \$1,210,916.81 in scholarships has been awarded! In addition, FMCIC sponsored five internships at local Free Methodist churches across Canada.

- 2. The Retired Ministers Team (RMT) and their Next Chapter Ministry meets monthly and has many ongoing projects, including a "Planning for Retirement Handbook", Next Chapter gatherings and an archiving project.
- **3.** The Women in Leadership Team builds on the Canadian Study Commission on Doctrine's wholehearted affirmation of the FMCIC's position on Women in Leadership. This team explores all the opportunities available to equip and release women for more effective leadership and ministry through the Free Methodist Church in Canada.





The Ministerial Formation department is actively serving:

118 Ordained Ministers (including appointed pastors, chaplains, denominational ministry, etc.), 7 Commissioned Ministers, 16 Ministerial Candidates, 8 Chaplains

Church Health

At the very heart of our movement is renewal. Methodism was born out of a renewal movement that brought widespread transformation. Early Free Methodism was another renewal movement, returning to the things that mattered. This renewal just needs to be rediscovered.

Rev. Jervis Djokoto is our Senior Director of Church Health and **Church Planting Ministries.** He has created a new church health pathway to simplify some of the essential church health elements - Biblically grounded, Christ-centered, Spirit empowered, Mission oriented (which means others oriented). A community of lifelong disciples who are given over to all the priorities, values and practices of the Kingdom of God.

Jervis Djokoto was honoured to be selected as one of only 5,000 delegates to be invited to the Fourth Lausanne Global Congress, South Korea in September 2024. It was a privilege to join Christian leaders from 202 nations around the world and to witness firsthand the powerful movement of the Holy Spirit across nations, cultures, and ministries. Prayer Ministry

The early church garnered the power of God through prayer. As a church, we must also pray. Under the Church Health Ministry, the National Prayer Ministry has been hosting a Prayer for Revival online at noon EDT/EST, 6 days a week for over two years. They also host monthly national prayer meetings as well as three monthly intercessory prayer groups. Each one of our churches is encouraged to have a Prayer Coordinator to help catalyze prayer in their local church.

Leadership **Networking**

The genius of the original Methodist movement was in the small accountability groups that met to encourage and strengthen each other. Our system of Pastor Networks with Network Leaders and Mentors, Regional Gatherings and Ministers Conferences builds on this. Developing and networking pastors is a key priority of a bishop.

Our Continuing Mission

Over the last year, Bishop Linda has met with approximately 100 pastors and leaders in groups. She is leading us through a process of listening to one another and asking deep questions about Free Methodist identity and the direction of our movement. We will continue to work together throughout 2025 to develop a shared understanding of the Free Methodist Church in Canada and to discern who God is calling us to become.

The Free Methodist Church in Canada has a rich history that we remember and celebrate. We are Kingdom leaders who see the truth and beauty of the Free Methodist Story and how it can help people be truly free.

And finally, of course, we are nothing without you - our local churches. You are the front lines of ministry. Without you living as faithful disciples, raising up leaders, impacting your communities, supporting our ministry together, introducing people to Jesus, and multiplying disciples, we could not minister together in all these ways. You are the joy and the purpose of what we do!

Our ministries don't operate in silos; we are interconnected and interdependent with one another and with all our churches. Together, we form a vibrant tapestry of mission, each part contributing to the whole. By working in unity, we amplify our impact, ensuring that every effort reflects our vision to see a healthy church within the reach of all people in Canada and beyond.

Our Giving Together through the CORE Ministry Fund is a covenant we made together at the 1996 General Conference. It is based on the Biblical tithe – 10% of your previous year's operating budget (less designated and missions giving). This is how we look after each other and accomplish our ministry together.

We are so thankful for God's provision and grace through you this past year. With the postal strike at the end of 2024, we understand that this is reflected in our CORE Ministry year-end giving, reaching only 90% of the budget. Thank you to all the churches that made the switch to e-Transfer for their CORE and Giving Streams remittances. This has proven to be both efficient and cost-effective

(cheaper than a stamp!). We are hoping to see churches that struggled to give during the postal strike catch up in their giving in the early part of 2025 to our CORE Ministry Fund.

Our final Giving Streams Funds in 2024 reached 133% of our Giving Streams Combined Budget. This is due to the overwhelming generosity of a one-time special gift towards some special missions projects, as well as our churches giving generously towards our Giving Streams. Thank You. However, International Child Care sponsorship reached only 74% of its 2024 Budget. This is such a vital ministry to so many children around the world that we encourage all our churches to promote individual child sponsorship at your local church.
